ASD and Special Interests

- Autism Spectrum Disorder is a neurological condition affecting social/communications, emotional and cognitive functioning. It is a broad continuum going from mildly affected to intensely impaired
- Many children with an ASD have a special interest. Some may have several. Some may not have any discernable special interest.
- The intensity and variation of **special interests** and their impact on the lives of individuals can range from mild to extreme.







Focus and diligence – The Asperger ability to focus on tasks for a long period of time without needing supervision or incentive is legendary. 2. Internal motivation — as opposed to be being motivated by praise, money, bills or acceptance. This ensures a job done with conscience, with personal pride. 3. Independent, unique thinking – people with AS tend to spend a lot of time alone and will likely have developed their own unique thoughts as opposed to a "herd" mentality. 4. Higher fluid intelligence — scientists in Japan have recently discovered that AS children have a higher fluid intelligence task consolatists childrens. But intelligence is the ability to find meaning in confusion and slove new problems. It is the ability to draw inferences and understand the relationships of various concepts, independent of a cquide knowledge," (Wikipedia 2009) Experts say that those with AS have a higher than average general itQ as well. 5.
